



Louis Rotella, III




Our son, Louie Rotella IV was born 21 years ago with Down syndrome. That day, my wife, Jill, and I held him in our arms—all four pounds of him—and understood that life would never be the same. Like all expecting parents, we had developed dreams for this child. At that time, the doctors told us all the things Louie would never do. He would likely never sur-

pass the grade-school level. He would never learn to drive. Or earn a college degree.

So we did what we had to do. We gathered strength. We developed new dreams. We focused on discovering all the things he *would* do. For one, he would turn out to be the funniest guy in the state of Nebraska. How's that for a blessing? Well, we all know that life isn't lived in a straight line. Louie was later diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes at 8 years old. When Jill and I got the news, once again, we knew life would never be the same. Lucky for us, we are blessed with strong family support, a dedicated team. My parents, Jill's, Aunts, Uncles, our children, and our faith have all become instrumental and part of Louie's team.
